At the end of each session. participants leave with their own bicycle, helmet, lock, bike lights and portable tool kit. Teen graduates of ROP Bike Tech classes work with their younger peers to provide information, skills and opportunities to make biking and healthy eating normative behaviors.

United Way of Santa Cruz County-\$12,000, this project will help implement the 2010 Healthy Options ordinance and work with non-traditional retail and eating environments such as farmer's markets. This project will help vendors identify a popular customer choice item and transform it into a healthy option. They will assist the vendors with visual promotion and marketing for the healthy items. Their focus will be on five vendors next year and will assist them in making the healthy choice the easy choice.

Volunteer Center of Santa Cruz County- \$6,500, this project will teach participants to grow their own produce by starting a community garden at a mental health house that supports individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders. Participants will grow a variety

of seasonal and organic produce, harvest the vegetables and then learn to cook with what they grow.

Watsonville Family YMCA-\$15,000, this project will teach and support people with pre-diabetes to make positive behavior changes to reduce their risk for developing type 2 diabetes. A trained lifestyle coach will help participants learn strategies for healthy eating, physical activity and other lifestyle changes. Groups will be formed in community locations to best accommodate participants' schedules and meet 25 times for one hour over the course of a year. Classes are available in Spanish and English.

Access to Care \$26,000 to the following organizations:

Coastal Kids Home Care-\$13,500, this project will support the Clinic on Wheels programming which offers 24/7, bilingual comprehensive medical care for children. Services ensure continuity of care from hospital to home including: 1) Long term skilled intermittent nursing visits for children living with cancer or other serious illness; 2) Palliative and end-of-life care for terminal children and those with life-limiting conditions; 3) Medication management and supervision for children coping with complications from cystic fibrosis, diabetes

and asthma; 4) Wound care, treatment for infections and other short term conditions; and 5) Newborn care and parent education for families caring for medically fragile infants.

Family Service Agency of the Central Coast- \$12,500, this project will support The Open Arms/Brazos Abiertos initiative which will provide free or low-cost mental health services to Pajaro Valley residents. It offers four distinct types of culturally appropriate services for: 1) Latina cancer patients; 2) Survivors of child sexual abuse; 3) Seniors; and 4) Individual counseling for Latinos and their families.

Oral Health \$29,000 to the following organizations: Dientes Community Dental Care-\$14,500-, funding will support an Oral Health Educator that will participate in healthrelated events and improve the oral health educational offerings in the Outreach Program. The Educator will increase awareness on the importance of proactive oral hygiene by educating "influencers" like primary health providers, pediatricians and other health professionals on the relationship between oral health habits and health outcomes.

Salud Para La Gente-\$14,500, this project will help provide subsidized dental care to

Community Alliance with Family Farmers-\$10,000, this project will provide Farm to School educational programs and technical assistance in procuring fresh, local produce in select Pajaro Valley Unified School District (PVUSD) cafeterias and continue to institutionalize a comprehensive Farm to School program. These efforts will increase the availability and consumption of fruit and vegetables among low-income students, grades K-12 in the PVUSD.

Food What?!- \$8,500, Food What (FW) requests support for their transformative youth health and development program~ "Food for Self, Food for Family, Food for Community"~ in the Pajaro Valley. Pajaro Valley youth will be supported to examine and overhaul their diets through FW's Spring

Internship, Summer Job and Fall Business Management Programs. These youth will impact other community members, changing youth food culture with their peer-to-peer health workshops, experience their fresh youthgrown produce and community leadership to improve the health of Pajaro Valley.

Girl Scouts of California's Central Coast-\$10,000 to support the expansion and the reorganization of an all-girl recreational soccer league in the Watsonville/Pajaro Valley area; delivered in a noncompetitive format. This year, the program will include a healthy eating component that will focus on increased consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables. In an effort to directly address the local obesity epidemic in underserved girl populations, GSCCC will expand the Soccer Series program in the Watsonville/Pajaro Valley area by establishing a K-6th grade program. The goal of this program is to increase participating girls' levels of weekly physical activity-both through weekly soccer games and drills and by empowering girls to seek additional active pursuits on their own.

Life Lab Science Program-\$12,700, this project will reduce two key factors that contribute to diabetes - poor nutrition and overweight/

obesity - by using gardenenhanced nutrition education (GENE) at four schools to improve Pajaro Valley children's openness to and acceptance of fresh fruits and vegetables in their regular diet. GENE is known to catalyze success in healthy eating programs, by giving children the opportunity to eat and enjoy the fruits and vegetables they grow themselves. Success with this for Pajaro Valley Unified School District (PVUSD) grade-school students is a key strategy to shifting lifelong eating patterns toward healthful, nutritious foods that will remediate prediabetes and protect against future type 2 diabetes risks.

Mesa Verde Gardens- \$10,000, this project will support the creation of two new Community Gardens in the Pajaro Valley Unified School District. Mesa Verde Community Gardens will connect 50 low-income, underserved Pajaro Valley families with an opportunity to grow their own pesticide-free, organic, fresh fruits and vegetables though the creation of small organic gardens.

Volunteer Center of Santa Cruz County-\$12,500, this grant will fund a second year of support for the pilot program, Beat Back Diabetes, which will provide physical activity, education, incentives and a

weight loss challenge to adults with psychiatric disabilities. This program will elicit incremental behavior change and reach high-risk mental health clients. The peer navigator will organize and facilitate activities such as wellness walks, hikes, stretching exercises, health Olympics, Zumba and nature walks. The educational component will include cooking classes, including affordable meal planning. They will also host a Nutrition Summit for mental health providers in Santa Cruz County, which will focus on diabetes prevention mechanisms and mental health implications.

Watsonville Family YMCA-\$15,000, this is a second year of Health Trust funding to support the new Pajaro Park in providing youth sports and recreation programs and physical fitness classes for lowincome Pajaro residents. The YMCA will organize, lead and run sports and recreation programs for children and families with a goal of increasing physical activity, safety and ultimately improved health. The specific programs will include soccer leagues, t-ball/softball, flag football, basketball, summer day and sports camps, after school tutoring and possible Saturday fun clubs. Adults will be able to participate in family fun days, walking clubs, parent-toddler play groups and other exercise classes.

Watsonville Film Festival \$3,000, The Watsonville Film Festival will host a bilingual healthy food film and conversation series during the fall of 2015. The films will be accompanied by postscreening discussion hosted by partnering organizations and youth. During discussion sessions, community members will brainstorm strategies to improve and increase preparation and consumption of nutritious foods and resist the presence of fast food businesses. They will also discuss alternative models of development. These activities will result in an "Action Plan": an outline for moving forward with implementing and funding the kinds of projects community members envision. The Healthy Foods Film Series creates space where attendees move beyond knowledge acquisition and reflection, and towards the implementation of personal and community-level changes.

Watsonville Kids Running Club \$3,000, The Watsonville Kids Running Club will organize weekly runs for both kids and parents. Activities will be outdoors and will emphasize on proper running form, injury prevention and proper stretching. Activities will mainly focus on running and building endurance so that every child is able to run a set

amount without stopping. The program will be tailored to each child's individual needs. Activities will include organized group runs, relays, running races and other sports that involve running. The nutrition portion will take place indoors in a classroom setting. Activities will include nutrition topics discussed in detail to build awareness in foods already consumed and to offer healthy alternatives to improve proper nutrition. In addition, they will prepare healthy recipes to show both kids and parents how easy and fun it can be to prepare their own healthy food.

Pajaro Valley Prevention & Student Assistance-\$10,000, the proposed project will serve uninsured Pajaro Valley residents with the highest unmet mental health needs, with a special focus on trauma related behavioral problems. Counselors will use the evidence-based treatment with

a special focus on trauma related behavioral problems. The average length of counseling will be five to ten sessions though some residents will continue in counseling for a longer duration in order to stabilize gains made. Counselors will conduct an extended psychosocial assessment to develop a treatment plan with specific goals, activities and evaluation benchmarks.

United Way of Santa Cruz County-\$8,694, (originally, they were awarded \$12,000, but returned unspent funds) this is a long-standing insurance coverage program that supports outreach and enrollment for uninsured children, ages 6-18, for Medi-Cal and Healthy Families programs. This funding will provide an insurance product for children who do not qualify for public programs. Healthy Kids provides comprehensive medical, dental, vision and mental health services.

**Oral Health** \$23,000 to the following organizations:

Dientes Community Dental Care \$8,000, this project supports the dental care for uninsured Pajaro Valley residents that will increase the number of Pajaro Valley adults and children with access to comprehensive dental care. The project provides dental treatment to uninsured Pajaro

Valley residents. Services include hygiene, general dentistry, endodontics and periodontal treatment.
